Leader 1: In the wasteland of war, the expenditure of resources knows no restraints; here our abundance is fully recognized and enthusiastically squandered.¹

Leader 2: A king is not saved by his great army; a warrior is not delivered by his great strength. The war horse is a vain hope for victory, and by its great might it cannot save. — Psalm 33: 15-17²

The People Together: We still have a choice today: nonviolent coexistence or violent co-annihilation.¹

Leader 1: Racism and its perennial ally — economic exploitation — provide the key to understanding most of the international complications of this generation. ¹

Leader 2: God Almighty and Glorious says: O My servants, I have forbidden oppression for Myself and have made it forbidden among you, so do not oppress one another. — Hadith Qudsi²

The People Together: We still have a choice today: nonviolent coexistence or violent co-annihilation.¹

Leader 1: The large power blocs talk passionately of pursuing peace while expanding defense budgets that already bulge, enlarging already awesome armies and devising ever more devastating weapons. . . . The heads of all the nations issue clarion calls for peace, yet they come to the peace table accompanied by bands of brigands, each bearing unsheathed swords. ¹

Leader 2: Then Jesus said to Peter: "Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the sword." — Matthew 26:52 ²

The People Together: We still have a choice today: nonviolent coexistence or violent co-annihilation.¹

Leader 1: Before it is too late, we must narrow the gaping chasm between our proclamations of peace and our lowly deeds which precipitate and perpetuate war True nonviolence is more than the absence of violence. It is the persistent and determined application of peaceable power to offenses against the community — in this case the world community.¹

Leader 2: However many holy words you read, however many you speak, what good will they do you if you do not act upon them? — the Buddha³

The People Together: We still have a choice today: nonviolent coexistence or violent co-annihilation.¹

Leader 1: A genuine revolution of values means in the final analysis that our loyalties must become ecumenical rather than sectional. Every nation must now develop an overriding loyalty to humankind as a whole to preserve

the best in their individual societies. This call for a world-wide fellowship that lifts neighborly concern beyond one's tribe, race, class and nation is in reality a call for an all-embracing and unconditional love for all people.¹

Leader 2: There are horses of many colors — brown, black, yellow, white — yet it is all one horse. So cattle, so all living things — animals, flowers, trees. So people: in this land where once were only Indians are now humanity of every color — white, black, yellow, red — yet all one people. That this should come to pass was in the heart of the Great Mystery. It is right thus. And everywhere there shall be peace.
